## MESSAGE FROM THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES

Kia ora Parents/Caregivers

At our last meeting of the Board of Trustees we welcomed Miriam Swanson on to the board in a co-opted trustee position. Miriam has a child in Harakeke and a professional background in Clinical Psychology.

Other items discussed included the approval of a \$500,000 + GST grant from the Wellington City Council to fund the renovation of the school pool. We are very grateful for the Council's support because without this funding the long-term viability of the school pool was in doubt. The tendering process for the upgrade work will commence in the next couple of months and the renovation work is expected to be completed by mid next year. The start date for the renovation work will be determined following the selection a construction company.

Keeping our students safe at school is very important and the new building brings with it a great space but also some challenges. The balustrade on the second storey is one such challenge. We want to ensure students do not climb it because of the risk of a fall. The school is taking steps to reduce the risk such as not allowing students up on the second storey deck during lunchtime. We are also working with the Ministry of Education's new build project team, to see if there are any other design solutions that can be made which can help mitigate the risk. You may wish to talk to your child about keeping safe and not using the balustrade as a climbing frame.

The 'official opening' of the new building will be taking place on Friday 26 October and we are working with the Ministry of Education on who will officiate at the opening. We hope to make this a fun, celebratory occasion for our school community. We will be inviting past students and families to this as well. The school will send out more information as plans are confirmed.

Chicken Pox is highly contagious and we have had quite a few cases recently at Newtown School. Please look out for the most characteristic symptom, an itchy, blister-like rash on the skin.

Symptoms include:

Skin: blister, scab, ulcers, or red spots

Whole body: fatigue, fever, or loss of appetite

**Also common:** headache, itching, sore throat, or swollen lymph nodes **Children must stay home until the blister like rash has scabbed over**

The main symptoms of influenza are fever, cough and sometimes vomiting or diarrhoea in younger children. These symptoms usually last 3-4 days but can be up to 7 days.

The following information will help reduce the spread of influenza and assist your school:

- 1. Advise a member of staff if your child has an illness as described above.
- 2. Check that your school has your correct and up-to-date contact details in case they need to contact you.
- 3. Keep sick children at home until feeling well and free from symptoms (usually 3-4 days but up to 7 days). Sick staff and students should not be at social or sporting events, school productions or camps. This is so they can rest and recover and don't spread illness to others.
- 4. It is important to use tissues to cover coughs and sneezes and to be very good about washing and drying hands thoroughly. An influenza brochure accessible at www.rph.org.nz/influenza has some good tips for looking after people with influenza and stopping it spreading to other people at home.
- 5. If anyone in your family has influenza we ask that they don't visit hospitals or community care homes or see people who may be at high risk of serious illness, such as pregnant women, young babies, or anyone who has cancer, lung, and heart or kidney conditions.

If you are worried about your child's symptoms or they have long-term health problems (e.g. asthma, diabetes, kidney, heart or immunity problems), then you should phone their usual doctor or Healthline 0800 611 116 for further advice. Otherwise they should recover at home and see their GP only if the illness gets worse or is not improving.

We want to deepen our understanding of the Maori world view and this can be done through developing our knowledge and use of the language. How fortunate are we that New Zealand is the ONLY country in the world that speaks Māori. Let's foster its growth.

Our New Zealand curriculum reminds us of the value of language...

'Languages are inseparably linked to the social and cultural contexts in which they are used. Languages and cultures play a key role in developing our personal, group, national, and human identities. Every language has its own ways of expressing meanings; each has intrinsic value and special significance for us.'

At Newtown School we have 43 ethnicities and we know this is a gift in our community. We love hearing our students and staff speaking in many languages and discussing their learning with other people from the same culture.
