
What's happening next week? See you at the cross country on Monday-we're all hoping for a fine enough day to run.

I joined the Board of Trustees at the last election 3 years ago. I have had a role in community engagement, and more recently as treasurer. I have also sat on the kaitiaki group of local schools known as the kāhui ako.

I've really enjoyed my time on the BOT and am grateful to have had the opportunity. I've been impressed with the commitment and care shown by the other Trustees and have felt lucky to see the energy and skill the School's staff and teachers bring.

The BOT's role is to participate in governance of the school. The Trustees represent our community in discussions about the direction of the school. The BOT works closely with Nicki to develop plans and policies that strive for the best outcomes for all learners. It then provides support and oversight as those are carried out. The BOT is not involved in the day to day operations of the school - that's for Nicki and her crew.

Here are some examples of work the BOT has done that I've enjoyed:

Secondly, the principal appointment process. It was a real responsibility to deliver the best principal we could. Thirdly, attending some of the professional development the school has run on the role of te Tiriti o Waitangi in education. There's lots of energy within the school to continue to learn and strive to be good treaty partners..
