

Around our kura

Te Kãkano Whakaatu Kākahu - Fashion Show

Firstly - a huge mihi and thanks to our kaiako Māori for sharing your korowai with us Thank you Maraea, Venise, Lisa and Rangimarie - your korowai were very beautiful and gave us great inspiration. Thank you to all our whānau for coming to see our korowai creations - you were a great audience and we loved all the clapping and cheering!

There are lots of parts to our korowai which we will share with you now. Firstly - we talked about taonga - and things that were precious to us. The pikitia on the back of our korowai represent things that are a taonga to us - like our tīpuna, our whānau, our culture and our kainga. The patterns on the bottom of our korowai are called Kōwhaiwhai and also tell a story about what is important to us. Our feathers are all different - some of us used paint, some used crayons and dye, and some of us even have real feathers and real leaves. The feathers took lots of time, and represent all the amazing things that make us unique and special. Finally, our cords are woven from harakeke that we have grown right here in our own kura.

Horoia ō ringaringa



Keep washing hands as there are a few tummy bugs around. If your child has been vomiting or had diarrheakeep them home for 48 hours to save any bugs spreading.

Kia Ngākau Hihiri

Learners who are curious have an interest in the world around us. We notice, think, reflect and share ideas. We wonder about possibilities and delight in discovering what is new.
