Hīkoi for Te Tiriti o Waitangi The hīkoi is a chance for us as a country

to show our support for Te Tiriti o Waitangi. As a school we support those staff and families who want to attend.

What is it?

The hīkoi starts from the top of the North Island on the 11th of November. It arrives in Te Whanganui a Tara (Wellington) on the 19th of November. The hīkoi is peaceful march to demonstrate how many people support Te Tiriti o Waitangi and why Te Tiriti is important for everyone.



Why?

The coalition government has proposed a Treaty Principles Bill. This bill involves a referendum, rewriting the Treaty principles, removing reference to the tino rangatiratanga (self determination) of Māori and changing how Te Tiriti o Waitangi can be interpreted by courts and law. The Waitangi Tribunal have said "We found that if this Bill were to be enacted it would be theworst, most comprehensive breach of Te Tiriti in modern times". Since coming into power, this Government as also removed or changed Te Tiriti o Waitangi provisions in many pieces of legislation.

Are you going to the hikoi?

The Board and school support the hīkoi. We are proudly co-governing and believe Te Tiriti benefits and enriches everyone who calls Aotearoa New Zealand home. If you are intending on going to the hīkoi with your children, can you please let the school know. Their absence will be recorded as justified. By talking with the school it will give us an idea who may be away. Please notify the school office if your child will be at the Hīkoi.

Things to know about Tiriti o Waitangi

Te Tiriti makes it possible for people to come to Aotearoa and make it their home.

Te Tiriti is about a relationship between two different and independent peoples. Good relationships are based on respect, dignity and care.

The intention of Te Tiriti was that Māori would continue to govern themselves and that everything they held precious would be protected.

The Crown has repeatedly failed to honour and respect Te Tiriti o Waitangi. This has made it harder for Māori to

Te Tiriti offers us a guide to make laws and systems based on the values we all share. This includes respect and dignity for people and the land.

Important: Council changes to parking around our kura!

Absolutely Positively Wellington City Council

There are some planned transport changes that will impact our community in the final weeks of November. The three school drop-off parks on Riddiford St will be removed from mid-November. As part of the council's TMP (traffic management plan), a request will be made for three P60 parks In Emmett St to be turned into P15 short-stay car parks to help the school with the transition during construction. During construction the work will happen after 9am to allow for our school drop offs to continue smoothly.

We have met with the Council to seek support for what our alternatives can be for safe drop offs for our community. There are limited alternatives. Ideally we encourage walking and cycling where we can. Currently, the drop-off and pick-up parking spaces in Mein Street are benign under-utilised. One of our aims is to encourage this to be the new drop-off zone for whānau. WCC staff will support the school to use this drop-off area.

We are still having conversations about the council's support for walking school bus and bike train. If you have any thoughts regarding transport at our kura, come and see Nicki.




