

A team of teachers with good knowledge of te reo māori will teach together - a programme similar to that run currently in Te Kākano.

I have taught year 4/5 for a number of years in Canada and am excited to join Pīwakawaka in year 3.


Throughout my teaching career I have had the privilege to work with so many wonderful tamariki.












































Sports News

Who are we?

We are a research team from He Käinga Oranga- Housing and Health Research programme at the University of Otago Wellington. We are researching how children with disabilities and their whänau feel about the houses they have lived in.



What do we want to know?

We want to know whether children with disabilities and their whānau have houses that are accessible, and what works and what doesn't work for housing for children with disabilities.
